

ON THE ALGEBRA OF CONSTANTS OF FREE METABELIAN LIE ALGEBRAS

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ABSTRACT. Let K be a field of characteristic zero, $X_n = \{x_1, \dots, x_n\}$ be a set of variables, $K[X_n]$ be the polynomial algebra and F_n be the free metabelian Lie algebra of rank n generated by X_n over the base field K . Well known result of Weitzenböck states that $K[X_n]^\delta = \{u \in K[X_n] \mid \delta(u) = 0\}$ is finitely generated as an algebra, where δ is a locally nilpotent linear derivation of $K[X_n]$. Extending this idea to the non-commutative algebras, recently the algebra F_n^δ of constants in free metabelian Lie algebras have been investigated. According to the findings, F_n^δ is not finitely generated as a Lie algebra; whereas, $F_n^\delta \cap F'_n$ is a finitely generated $K[X_n]^\delta$ -module and a list of generators for $n \leq 4$ was given. In this work, in filling the gap in the list of small n 's we work in F_5 and give a list of generators of F_5^δ where $\delta(x_5) = x_4$, $\delta(x_4) = 0$, $\delta(x_3) = x_2$, $\delta(x_2) = x_1$ and $\delta(x_1) = 0$.

1. INTRODUCTION

Let $K[X_n]$ be the polynomial algebra over a field K of characteristic 0 freely generated by the set of variables $X_n = \{x_1, \dots, x_n\}$ and let KX_n be the vector space with basis X_n . A nonzero locally nilpotent linear derivation δ of the polynomial algebra $K[X_n]$ is called a Weitzenböck derivation. The canonical action of the general linear group $GL_n(K)$ on the polynomial algebra $K[X_n]$ defines the set

$$K[X_n]^G = \{p \in K[X_n] \mid g \cdot p = p, \quad \forall \quad g \in G\}$$

which is the algebra of invariants of the subgroup $G \leq GL_n(K)$. The 14th of 23 Hilbert problems asked whether the algebra $K[X_n]^G$ is finitely generated as an algebra for any $G \leq GL_n(K)$. Different results have been found on the topic such as Nagata [7] who gave a counterexample which consists of 13 commuting locally nilpotent derivations of a polynomial ring in 32 variables for which the kernel is not finitely generated. Even if the concept was not correct in general some affirmative results have been found one can see the approach of Noether [8] who proved the case for finite groups G , and Weitzenböck [10] who confirmed that the algebra of constants of the derivation δ in the algebra $K[X_n]$

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$$K[X_n]^\delta = \text{Ker}\delta = \{u \in K[X_n] \mid \delta(u) = 0\}$$

is finitely generated.

For associative polynomial algebra $K\langle X_n \rangle$ generated by X_n over a field K , the algebra $K\langle X_n \rangle^G$ of invariants is finitely generated if and only if G is a cyclic group which acts by scalar multiplication via [4, 6]. Another approach here is when the group acts on relatively free algebras in a variety of associative algebras, Bryant and Drensky [2, 5] proved that the algebra L_n^G and F_n^G are not finitely generated for finite groups G where L_n and F_n are the free Lie algebra and the free metabelian Lie algebra of rank n over K respectively. In the case of free metabelian Lie algebra, even if the algebra F_n^G is not finitely generated, the commutator ideal F_n' of F_n is finitely generated $K[X_n]^G$ -module under an appropriate action of $K[X_n]$ on F_n' .

If δ is a Weitzenböck derivation, then it is locally nilpotent and the linear map $\exp(\delta)$ acting on the vector space KX_n is unipotent. Hence, the algebra $K[X_n]^\delta$ of constants of δ is equal to the algebra of invariants

$$K[X_n]^{<\exp(\delta)>} = \{u \in K[X_n] \mid \exp(\delta)(u) = u\}.$$

The algebra of invariants of $\exp(\delta)$ is equal to the algebra of invariants $K[X_n]^G$, where the group G consists of all elements $\exp(c\delta)$, $c \in K$.

Let δ_n be the Weitzenböck derivation of $K[X_n]$ which corresponds to a single $n \times n$ Jordan block of size n , then,

$$\delta_n : x_n \rightarrow x_{n-1} \rightarrow \cdots \rightarrow x_1 \rightarrow 0.$$

and such Weitzenböck derivations is called basic.

Dangovski et al.[3] proved that if δ is a Weitzenböck derivation of the free metabelian Lie algebra L_n/L_n'' , then the algebra $(L_n'/L_n'')^\delta$ of constants of δ in the commutator ideal L_n'/L_n'' of L_n/L_n'' is a finitely generated $K[X_n]^\delta$ -module. In this work, we give the explicit set of generators of the algebra of constants of the $K[X_n]^\delta$ -module $(L_n'/L_n'')^\delta$ for $n = 5$ as a non-basic Weitzenböck derivation.

2. PRELIMINARIES

It is well known that a Lie algebra L is a vector space over K endowed with a bilinear map: $[\cdot, \cdot] : L \times L \rightarrow L, (x_1, x_2) \rightarrow [x_1, x_2]$ satisfying the following conditions:

$$[x_1, x_1] = 0$$

$$[[x_1, x_2], x_3] + [[x_2, x_3], x_1] + [[x_3, x_1], x_2] = 0$$

for all $x_1, x_2, x_3 \in L$ and the second condition is known as Jacobi identity.

Let L_n be the free Lie algebra over the field K of characteristic zero freely generated by a finite set $X_n = \{x_1, \dots, x_n\}$ with $n \geq 2$. The elements of X_n are Lie monomials of length 1 and those Lie monomials has the form of

$$[x_1, x_2, x_3] = [x_1, x_2]ad x_3 = [[x_1, x_2], x_3]$$

for the sake of simplicity. Hence, we may extent this inductively as

$$[x_1, x_2, x_3, \dots, x_n] = [\dots [[x_1, x_2], x_3], \dots, x_n], n \geq 3,$$

for all $x_1, x_2, \dots, x_n \in L_n$. In this way, every element of L_n can be written as a linear combination of the left normed monomials, which means that, the set of all left normed Lie monomials spans the whole free Lie algebra L_n on X_n .

The quotient algebra

$$F_n = L_n/L_n'' = L_n/[[L_n, L_n], [L_n, L_n]]$$

is called the free metabelian Lie algebra of rank n defined by metabelian identity $[[x_1, x_2], [x_3, x_4]] = 0$. F_n is generated by free generators $y_1 = x_1 + L_n'', \dots, y_n = x_n + L_n''$ hence, the commutator ideal F_n' has a basis consisting of all

$$[y_{i_1}, y_{i_2}, \dots, y_{i_n}] = [\dots [[y_{i_1}, y_{i_2}], y_{i_3}], \dots, y_{i_n}], \quad i_1 > i_2 \leq i_3 \leq \dots \leq i_n \leq n.$$

Therefore, F_n' is furnished with a natural structure of module of $K[y_1, \dots, y_n]$. For more information see [1].

A vector space V over a field K of characteristic zero is called graded K -vector space if it has a direct sum

$$V = \sum_{k \geq 0} V^{(k)}$$

where $V^{(k)}$ is a subspace $k \geq 0$. In particular, we define a multigrading on V if

$$V = \sum_{i=1}^m \sum_{k_i \geq 0} V^{(k_1, \dots, k_m)},$$

and $V^{(k_1, \dots, k_m)}$ is called homogeneous component of degree (k_1, \dots, k_m) .

Since $V = \bigoplus_{k \geq 0} V^{(k)}$ is finitely generated graded K -algebra, then we define the Hilbert function of V as

$$H(V, k) = \dim_K(V^{(k)})$$

where $\dim_K(V^{(k)})$ is the dimension of the vector space $V^{(k)}$ over K .

Let F_n be a relatively free algebra of the variety \mathcal{B} of (not necessarily associative or Lie) algebra, then is graded vector space with finite dimension of homogenous component of degree k of F_n . Hence, we can define formal power series also known as the Hilbert or Poincaré series

$$H(F_n, t) = \sum_{k \geq 0} \dim_K(V^{(k)}) \cdot t^k.$$

For multigrated of algebra F_n with a \mathbb{Z}^n -grading; the Hilbert series of F_n is

$$H(F_n, t_1, \dots, t_k) = \sum_{k_j \geq 0} \dim F_n^{(m_1, \dots, m_k)} \cdot t_1^{m_1} \dots t_k^{m_k}$$

where $F_n^{(m_1, \dots, m_k)}$ is the multihomogeneous component of degree (m_1, \dots, m_k) .

Equivalently, for a Weitzenböck derivations δ of F_n , the algebra of constants F_n^δ is also a graded and eventually its Hilbert series is

$$H(F_n^\delta, t) = \sum_{m \geq 0} \dim_K(F_n^\delta)^{(m)} \cdot t^m$$

By using direct standards computations from Maple we give the Hilbert series of the the algebra $K[X_n]^{\delta_n}$ of constant of polynomial algebra and the algebra L_n/L_n'' of constant of free metabelian Lie algebra for small $n \leq 4$ as a basic and for $n = 5$ Weitzenböck derivation.

For $n = 2$, $\delta = \delta(1)$

The Hilbert series of algebra of constants $K[X_2]^{\delta_2}$ is

$$H_{GL_2}(K[X_2]^{\delta_2}, t_1, t_2, z) = \frac{1}{1 - t_1 z}$$

and the Hilbert series of algebra of constants $(L_2/L_2'')^{\delta_2}$ is

$$H_{GL_2}((L_2/L_2'')^{\delta_2}, t_1, t_2, z) = t_1 z + \frac{t_1 t_2 z^2}{1 - t_1 z}$$

For $n = 3$, $\delta = \delta(2)$

The Hilbert series of algebra of constants $K[X_3]^{\delta_3}$ becomes

$$H_{GL_2}(K[X_3]^{\delta_3}, t_1, t_2, z) = \frac{1}{(1 - t_1^2 z)(1 - t_1^2 t_2^2 z^2)}$$

and the Hilbert series of algebra of constants $(L_3/L_3'')^{\delta_3}$ is

$$H_{GL_2}((L_3/L_3'')^{\delta_3}, t_1, t_2, z) = \frac{t_1^3 t_2 z^2}{(1 - t_1^2 z)(1 - t_1 t_2 z)}$$

For $n = 4$, $\delta = \delta(3)$

The Hilbert series of algebra of constants $K[X_4]^{\delta_4}$ is

$$H_{GL_2}(K[X_4]^{\delta_4}, t_1, t_2, z) = \frac{1 - t_1^{12} t_2^6 z^6}{(1 - t_1^3 z)(1 - t_1^4 t_2^2 z^2)(1 - t_1^6 t_2^3 z^3)(1 - t_1^6 t_2^6 z^4)}$$

while the Hilbert series of algebra of constants $(L_4/L_4'')^{\delta_4}$ is

$$H_{GL_2}((L_4/L_4'')^{\delta_4}, t_1, t_2, z) = \frac{t_1^3 t_2 z^2 (t_1^2 + t_2^2 + t_1^4 t_2^4 z^2 + t_1^5 t_2^6 z^3 - t_1^8 t_2^6 z^4)}{(1 - t_1^3 z)(1 - t_1^2 t_2 z)(1 - t_1^6 t_2^6 z^4)}$$

The followings are well known generators of the algebra $K[X_n]^{\delta_n}$ of constants of polynomial algebras and the algebras L'_n/L''_n of constant of free metabelian Lie algebra for $n = 3, 4$ such that $\delta_n : x_n \rightarrow x_{n-1} \rightarrow \cdots \rightarrow x_1 \rightarrow 0$ and this can found by using the Hilbert series of polynomial algebra and the Hilbert series of free metabelian Lie algebra respectively where the bidegree of denominator represent the generators and the bidegree of numerator represent the relations. For more information one can see [9, 3]. For $n = 3$, the algebra of constants $K[X_3]^{\delta_3}$ is generated by x_1 and $-2x_1x_3 + x_2^2$ while the $K[X_3]^{\delta_3}$ -module L'_3/L''_3 is generated by $[x_2, x_1]$ and $[x_3, x_1, x_1] - [x_2, x_1, x_2]$. For $n = 4$, the algebra of constants $K[X_4]^{\delta_4}$ is generated by $f_1 = x_1$, $f_2 = -2x_1x_3 + x_2^2$, $f_3 = 3x_1^2x_4 - 3x_1x_2x_3 + x_3^2$ and $f_4 = 6x_1x_2x_3x_4 - 2x_2^3x_4 - 3x_1^2x_4^2 - 8/3x_1x_3^3 + x_2^2x_3^2$ with single relation $3f_1^2f_4 + f_3^2 - f_2^3 = 0$ while the $K[X_4]^{\delta_4}$ -module L'_4/L''_4 is generated by

$$\begin{aligned} & [x_2, x_1], \\ & [x_4, x_1] - [x_3, x_2], \\ & [x_3, x_1, x_1] - [x_2, x_1, x_2], \\ & 3[x_2, x_1, x_4] - 2[x_3, x_1, x_3] + [x_3, x_2, x_2], \\ & [x_3, x_2, x_2, x_2] - 3[x_3, x_1, x_1, x_4] + 4[x_4, x_1, x_1, x_3] \\ & + 3[x_2, x_1, x_2, x_4] - 2[x_4, x_1, x_2, x_2] - [x_3, x_1, x_2, x_3] \\ & 3[x_4, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_2] - 3[x_3, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_3] + 6[x_3, x_1, x_2, x_3, x_3] \\ & - 4[x_2, x_1, x_3, x_3, x_3] + 9[x_2, x_1, x_1, x_4, x_4] + 12[x_4, x_1, x_1, x_3, x_3] \\ & - 18[x_3, x_1, x_1, x_3, x_4] - 12[x_4, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_3] + 9[x_3, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_4] \end{aligned}$$

and,

$$\begin{aligned}
 c_7 = & 3[x_4, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_2] - 3[x_3, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_3] - 8[x_3, x_1, x_1, x_3, x_3, x_3] \\
 & - 18[x_4, x_1, x_1, x_1, x_3, x_4] + 18[x_3, x_1, x_1, x_1, x_4, x_4] - 15[x_4, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_3] \\
 & + 3[x_3, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_4] + 9[x_2, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_3, x_4] + 12[x_3, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_3, x_3] \\
 & - 10[x_2, x_1, x_2, x_3, x_3, x_3] + 9[x_4, x_1, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_4] - 18[x_2, x_1, x_1, x_2, x_4, x_4] \\
 & + 18[x_4, x_1, x_1, x_2, x_3, x_3] - 18[x_3, x_1, x_1, x_2, x_3, x_4] + 18[x_2, x_1, x_1, x_3, x_3, x_4]

3. MAIN RESULTS

Theorem 3.1. *Let δ_{3x_2} be a nonbasic Weitzenböck derivation such that $\delta_{3x_2} : x_3 \rightarrow x_2 \rightarrow x_1 \rightarrow 0$ and $\delta_{3x_2} : x_5 \rightarrow x_4 \rightarrow 0$. Then $K[X_5]^{\delta_{3x_2}}$ -module $(L'_5/L''_5)^{\delta_{3x_2}}$ is generated by $\{c_1, \dots, c_{11}\}$ where,*

$$\begin{aligned}
 c_1 &= [x_2, x_1] \\
 c_2 &= [x_4, x_1] \\
 c_3 &= [x_5, x_1] - [x_4, x_2] \\
 c_4 &= [x_5, x_4] \\
 c_5 &= [x_2, x_1, x_5] + [x_4, x_2, x_2] - 2[x_4, x_1, x_3] \\
 c_6 &= [x_2, x_1, x_5] - [x_3, x_1, x_4] \\
 c_7 &= [x_3, x_1, x_1] - [x_2, x_1, x_2] \\
 c_8 &= [x_5, x_1, x_5] - [x_5, x_2, x_4] - [x_4, x_2, x_5] + 2[x_4, x_3, x_4] \\
 c_9 &= [x_2, x_1, x_5, x_5] - 2[x_3, x_1, x_4, x_5] + 2[x_3, x_2, x_4, x_4] \\
 c_{10} &= [x_3, x_1, x_1, x_5] - [x_2, x_1, x_2, x_5] - [x_3, x_1, x_2, x_4] + 2[x_2, x_1, x_3, x_4] \\
 c_{11} &= [x_5, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_4] + [x_4, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_5] + 2[x_5, x_1, x_1, x_3, x_5] \\
 & - [x_3, x_1, x_1, x_5, x_5] - [x_5, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_5] + [x_2, x_1, x_2, x_5, x_5] \\
 & - 2[x_4, x_2, x_2, x_3, x_4] + 4[x_4, x_1, x_3, x_3, x_4] - 2[x_3, x_1, x_3, x_4, x_4] \\
 & - 2[x_5, x_1, x_2, x_3, x_4] - 2[x_4, x_1, x_2, x_3, x_5] + 2[x_3, x_1, x_2, x_4, x_5].
 \end{aligned}$$

Proof. Let $K[X_5]$ be the polynomial algebras generated by $X_5 = \{x_1, x_2, x_3, x_4, x_5\}$. Then $K[X_5]^{\delta_{3x_2}}$ is the algebras of constants of polynomial algebras for nonbasic Weitzenböck derivations such that $\delta_{3x_2} : x_3 \rightarrow x_2 \rightarrow x_1 \rightarrow 0$ and $\delta_{3x_2} : x_5 \rightarrow x_4 \rightarrow 0$. By using Maple computation, we have

$$h_0 = \frac{v_1^2 v_2 z^2 + 1}{(v_1 z - 1)(v_1 v_2 z + 1)(v_1^2 v_2^2 z^3 - 1)(v_1 v_2 z - 1)(v_1^2 z - 1)}$$

Let consider that $v_1 = t_1$ and $v_2 = t_2$, then we have the Hilbert series of algebras of constants of polynomial algebra which is

$$H_{GL_2}(K[X_5]^{\delta_{3x_2}}, t_1, t_2, z^2) = \frac{1 + t_1^2 t_2 z^2}{(1 - t_1^2 z)(1 - t_1^2 t_2^2 z^2)(1 - t_1^2 t_2^2 z^3)(1 - t_1 z)}$$

Therefore, the algebras $(K[X_5]^{\delta_{3x_2}})$ is generated by the algebraically independent polynomials

$f_1 = x_1$, $f_2 = x_2^2 - 2x_1 x_3$, $f_3 = x_1 x_5^2 - 2x_2 x_4 x_5 + 2x_3 x_4^2$, $f_4 = x_4$ and $f_5 = x_1 x_5 - x_2 x_4$; with single relation $f_5^2 = f_2 f_4^2 + f_1 f_3$. Similarly, the Hilbert series of the algebra $(L'_5/L''_5)^{\delta_{3x_2}}$ of constant of free metabelian Lie algebra is

$$\begin{aligned}
H_{GL_2}((L'_5/L''_5)^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}, t_1, t_2, z) &= \\
&= \frac{N}{(1-t_1^2 z)(1-t_1 t_2 z)(1-t_1^2 t_2^2 z^3)(1-t_1 z)} \\
&= \left(\frac{N}{(1-t_1^2 z)(1-t_1^2 t_2^2 z^2)(1-t_1^2 t_2^3 z^3)(1-t_1 z)} \right) (1+t_1 t_2 z)
\end{aligned}$$

where

$$\begin{aligned}
N &= (t_1^3 t_2 + t_1^3 + t_1^2 t_2 + t_1 t_2) z^2 + (t_1^3 t_2^2 - t_1^4 t_2) z^3 + (t_1^3 t_2^2 + t_1^3 t_2^3) z^4 \\
&\quad + (-t_1^4 t_2^3 - t_1^5 t_2^2 - t_1^5 t_2^3) z^5 + t_1^6 t_2^3 z^6
\end{aligned}$$

Therefore,

$$\begin{aligned}
H_{GL_2}((L'_5/L''_5)^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}, t_1, t_2, z) &= (t_1^3 t_2 + t_1^3 + t_1^2 t_2 + t_1 t_2) z^2 \\
&\quad + (t_1^3 t_2^2 - t_1^4 t_2 + t_1^4 t_2^2 + t_1^4 t_2 + t_1^3 t_2^2 + t_1^2 t_2^2) z^3 \\
&\quad + (t_1^3 t_2^2 + t_1^3 t_2^3 + t_1^4 t_2^3 - t_1^5 t_2^2) z^4 \\
&\quad + (-t_1^4 t_2^3 - t_1^5 t_2^2 - t_1^5 t_2^3 + t_1^4 t_2^3 + t_1^4 t_2^4) z^5 \\
&\quad + (t_1^6 t_2^3 - t_1^5 t_2^4 - t_1^6 t_2^3 - t_1^6 t_2^4) z^6 + t_1^7 t_2^4 z^7
\end{aligned}$$

The power of positive sign of t 's in Hilbert series of algebras of constants of free metabelian Lie algebra represents the bidegree of generators and the power negative sign represents the relations while the power of z 's represents the length. This means that we have the bidegrees (3, 1); (3, 0); (2, 1) and (2, 2) of length 2 which corresponds to the generators c_1, c_2, c_3 and c_4 respectively. Therefore, $K[X_5]^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}$ -module $(L'_5/L''_5)^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}$ has four generators c_1, c_2, c_3 and c_4 of length 2 as follows:

$$\begin{aligned}
c_1 &= [x_2, x_1] \\
c_2 &= [x_4, x_1] \\
c_3 &= [x_5, x_1] - [x_4, x_2] \\
c_4 &= [x_5, x_4].
\end{aligned}$$

Next, we have 4 bidegrees (3, 2); (3, 2); (4, 2) and (2, 2) of length 3 which corresponds to the generators c_5, c_6, c_7 and c_8 respectively. Therefore, $K[X_5]^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}$ -module $(L'_5/L''_5)^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}$ has four generators c_5, c_6, c_7 and c_8 of length 3 as follow:

$$\begin{aligned}
c_5 &= [x_2, x_1, x_5] + [x_4, x_2, x_2] - 2[x_4, x_1, x_3] \\
c_6 &= [x_2, x_1, x_5] - [x_3, x_1, x_4] \\
c_7 &= [x_3, x_1, x_1] - [x_2, x_1, x_2] \\
c_8 &= [x_5, x_1, x_5] - [x_5, x_2, x_4] - [x_4, x_2, x_5] + 2[x_4, x_3, x_4].
\end{aligned}$$

Similarly, we expect two bidegrees (3, 3) and (4, 3) of length 4 which can produce two generators c_9 and c_{10} . Therefore, $K[X_5]^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}$ -module $(L'_5/L''_5)^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}$ has two generators c_9 and c_{10} of length 4 as follows:

$$\begin{aligned}
c_9 &= [x_2, x_1, x_5, x_5] - 2[x_3, x_1, x_4, x_5] + 2[x_3, x_2, x_4, x_4] \\
c_{10} &= [x_3, x_1, x_1, x_5] - [x_2, x_1, x_2, x_5] - [x_3, x_1, x_2, x_4] + 2[x_2, x_1, x_3, x_4].
\end{aligned}$$

By continuing in the same way, we found another bidegree $(4, 4)$ of length 5 that has new generator and is denoted as c_{11} so, $K[X_5]^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}$ -module $(L'_5/L''_5)^{\delta_{3 \times 2}}$ has single generators c_{11} of length 5 such that

$$\begin{aligned} c_{11} = & [x_5, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_4] + [x_4, x_2, x_2, x_2, x_5] + 2[x_5, x_1, x_1, x_3, x_5] \\ & - [x_3, x_1, x_1, x_5, x_5] - [x_5, x_1, x_2, x_2, x_5] + [x_2, x_1, x_2, x_5, x_5] \\ & - 2[x_4, x_2, x_2, x_3, x_4] + 4[x_4, x_1, x_3, x_3, x_4] - 2[x_3, x_1, x_3, x_4, x_4] \\ & - 2[x_5, x_1, x_2, x_3, x_4] - 2[x_4, x_1, x_2, x_3, x_5] + 2[x_3, x_1, x_2, x_4, x_5]. \end{aligned}$$

Note that the not-used bidegrees have correspondence with the other generators hence, we conclude that those bidegrees do not generate the new generators. \square

4. CONCLUSION

In this study, we found the set of generators of the algebra $F_5^{\delta_5}$ of constants of free metabelian Lie algebra such that δ_5 is a non-basic Weitzenböck derivation and as recommendation one can extend our work and give the explicit set of generators of the algebra $F_n^{\delta_n}$ of constants for $n \geq 5$ where δ_5 is a basic Weitzenböck derivation.
