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# **Periodic Solutions for Some Systems of Difference Equations**

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## Abstract

We will show in this paper that all solutions for the systems

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(2)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(2)} - 1}, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(3)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(3)} - 1}, ..., \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(1)} - 1},$$

and

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(\kappa)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(\kappa)} - 1}, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(1)} - 1}, \dots, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(\kappa-1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(\kappa-1)} - 1}$$

are periodic with period p where p is given by

$$p = \left\{ \begin{array}{ccc} \kappa & \text{if} & \kappa = 0 (mod2), \\ 2\kappa & \text{if} & \kappa \neq 0 (mod2), \end{array} \right\}$$

where  $\alpha$  and  $\varkappa_0^{(1)}, \varkappa_0^{(2)}, ..., \varkappa_0^{(\kappa)}$  are nonzero real numbers with  $\varkappa_0^{(i)} \neq \frac{1}{\alpha}, i = 1, 2, ..., \kappa$ , for some  $\kappa \in \mathbb{N}$ .

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# 1. Introduction

Difference equations is a very important topic in our life because they appear as mathematical models describing many real life situations for examples in probability theory, statistical problems, number theory, geometry, electrical networks, genetics, biology, physics, ecology, economics, engineering, medicine, etc [1]. Therefore, the study of difference equations has received great attention from researchers around the world. See for examples [1]-[21].

Iricanin et al. [12] investigated the positive solution for the following systems

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{1 + \varkappa_n^{(2)}}{\varkappa_{n-1}^{(3)}}, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{1 + \varkappa_n^{(3)}}{\varkappa_{n-1}^{(4)}}, \dots, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{1 + \varkappa_n^{(1)}}{\varkappa_{n-1}^{(2)}}$$

and

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{1 + \varkappa_n^{(2)} + \varkappa_{n-1}^{(3)}}{\varkappa_{n-2}^{(4)}}, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{1 + \varkappa_n^{(3)} + \varkappa_{n-1}^{(4)}}{\varkappa_{n-2}^{(5)}}, \dots, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{1 + \varkappa_n^{(1)} + \varkappa_{n-1}^{(2)}}{\varkappa_{n-2}^{(3)}},$$

where  $\kappa$  be a nonnegative integer number.

Papaschinopoluos et al. [11] studied the behavior for the systems

$$\begin{aligned} \varkappa_1(\upsilon+1) &= \frac{\alpha_{\kappa}\varkappa_{\kappa}(\upsilon) + \beta_{\kappa}}{\varkappa_{\kappa-1}(\upsilon-1)}, \\ \varkappa_2(\upsilon+1) &= \frac{\alpha_1\varkappa_1(\upsilon) + \beta_1}{\varkappa_{\kappa}(\upsilon-1)}, \\ \varkappa_i(\upsilon+1) &= \frac{\alpha_{i-1}\varkappa_{i-1}(\upsilon) + \beta_{i-1}}{\varkappa_{i-2}(\upsilon-1)}, i = 3, 4, \dots, \kappa \end{aligned}$$

where  $\alpha_i, \beta_i, i = 1, 2, ..., \kappa$ , are positive constants with  $\kappa \ge 3$  is an integer, and the values  $\varkappa_i(-1), \varkappa_i(0), i = 1, 2, ..., \kappa$ , are positive real numbers.

In [18] the periodicity for the solutions of some systems of the form

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(2)}}{\varkappa_n^{(2)} - 1}, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(3)}}{\varkappa_n^{(3)} - 1}, \dots, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(1)}}{\varkappa_n^{(1)} - 1},$$

and

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(\kappa)}}{\varkappa_n^{(\kappa)} - 1}, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(1)}}{\varkappa_n^{(1)} - 1}, \dots, \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(\kappa-1)}}{\varkappa_n^{(\kappa-1)} - 1}$$

was studied, where  $\varkappa_0^{(i)} \neq 1$ ,  $i = 1, 2, ..., \kappa$ . Also, in [19] the periodic character for the positive solutions of the coming systems of difference equations

$$\begin{split} \varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} &= \frac{\varkappa_{n}^{(2)}\varkappa_{n-1}^{(3)}}{\varkappa_{n-1}^{(2)}\varkappa_{n-1}^{(3)} - \varkappa_{n-1}^{(2)} - \varkappa_{n-1}^{(3)}},\\ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} &= \frac{\varkappa_{n}^{(3)}\varkappa_{n-1}^{(4)}}{\varkappa_{n}^{(3)}\varkappa_{n-1}^{(4)} - \varkappa_{n}^{(3)} - \varkappa_{n-1}^{(4)}}, \end{split}$$

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$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_{n}^{(1)}\varkappa_{n-1}^{(2)}}{\varkappa_{n-1}^{(1)}\varkappa_{n-1}^{(2)} - \varkappa_{n}^{(1)} - \varkappa_{n-1}^{(2)}}$$

was studied, where  $\frac{1}{\varkappa_{0}^{(1)}} + \frac{1}{\varkappa_{-1}^{(2)}} \neq 1, \frac{1}{\varkappa_{0}^{(2)}} + \frac{1}{\varkappa_{0}^{(3)}} \neq 1, \dots, \frac{1}{\varkappa_{0}^{(\kappa)}} + \frac{1}{\varkappa_{-1}^{(1)}} \neq 1 \text{ and } \varkappa_{-1}^{(1)}, \varkappa_{0}^{(1)}, \varkappa_{-1}^{(2)}, \varkappa_{0}^{(2)}, \dots, \varkappa_{-1}^{(\kappa)}, \varkappa_{0}^{(\kappa)} \text{ are nonzero real numbers.}$ 

Throughout the present paper we will deal with the periodicity character to the solutions for some systems of the form

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(2)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(2)} - 1}, \ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(3)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(3)} - 1}, \dots, \ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(1)} - 1},$$

and

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{\varkappa_{n}^{(\kappa)}}{\alpha \varkappa_{n}^{(\kappa)} - 1}, \ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{\varkappa_{n}^{(1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_{n}^{(1)} - 1}, \dots, \ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_{n}^{(\kappa-1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_{n}^{(\kappa-1)} - 1}$$

where  $\alpha$  and  $\varkappa_0^{(1)}, \varkappa_0^{(2)}, ..., \varkappa_0^{(\kappa)}$  are non zero real numbers with  $\varkappa_0^{(i)} \neq \frac{1}{\alpha}, i = 1, 2, ..., \kappa$ , for some  $\kappa \in \mathbb{N}$ .

Now we present and prove some lemmas that will be used in proving the main results in this paper. Let  $gcd(\kappa, y)$  denotes the greatest common divisor for the integers  $\kappa$  and y.

**Lemma 1.1.** Assume that  $gcd(\kappa, 2) = 1$  for some  $\kappa \in \mathbb{N}$ , then the numbers  $p_y = 2y + 1$ , (or  $p_y = -2y + 1$ ),  $y = 0, 1, ..., \kappa - 1$ , satisfy  $p_{y_1} - p_{y_2} \neq 0 \pmod{\kappa}$ , whenever  $y_1 \neq y_2$ .

*Proof.* For the sake of a contradiction assume that  $p_{y_1} - p_{y_2} = 0 \pmod{\kappa}$ , with  $y_1 \neq y_2$ . Then we have  $2(y_1 - y_2) = p_{y_1} - p_{y_2} = \kappa m$  for some  $m \in \mathbb{Z} \setminus \{0\}$ . Since  $gcd(\kappa, 2) = 1$ , it is easy to see that  $\kappa$  is a divisor to  $y_1 - y_2$ . Again, since  $y_1, y_2 \in \{0, 1, ..., \kappa - 1\}$ , it follows that  $|y_1 - y_2| < \kappa$ , and this is a contradiction.

**Remark 1.2.** It follows from Lemma 1.1 that the remainders  $q_y$ ,  $y = 0, 1, ..., \kappa - 1$  for the numbers  $p_y = 2y + 1$ ,  $y = 0, 1, ..., \kappa - 1$ , which were gotten from dividing the values  $p_y$  by  $\kappa$  are reciprocally different, they are included in a set  $S = \{0, 1, ..., \kappa - 1\}$ , making some permutations of the ordered set  $(0, 1, ..., \kappa - 1)$ , finally  $p_{\kappa} = 2\kappa + 1$  is the first number having the form 2y + 1,  $y \in \mathbb{N}$ , with  $p_1 - p_0 \equiv 0 \pmod{\kappa}$ .

Lemma 1.3. Every solution for the following equation

$$\varkappa_{n+1} = \frac{\varkappa_n}{\alpha \varkappa_n - 1}, \quad \text{for all} \quad n \ge 0, \tag{1.1}$$

is periodic with period two where  $\alpha$ ,  $\varkappa_0 \in \mathbb{R} \setminus \{0\}$  with  $\varkappa_0 \neq \frac{1}{\alpha}$ .

*Proof.* Let  $\{\varkappa_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  is a solution for Eq.(1.1) such that  $\alpha \varkappa_0 \neq 1$ . Then it is easy, by direct substitution in Eq.(1.1), to obtain that  $\{\varkappa_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  is periodic with prime period two and has the formula

$$\left\{\varkappa_0, \ \frac{\varkappa_0}{\alpha\varkappa_0-1}, \ \varkappa_0, \ \frac{\varkappa_0}{\alpha\varkappa_0-1}, \ \varkappa_0, \ \frac{\varkappa_0}{\alpha\varkappa_0-1}, \ldots\right\}.$$

The proof is so complete.

Let  $f: G \to G$  be a continuous function on  $G \subseteq \mathbf{R}$  and let D denotes the subset of all fixed points of  $f^2 = f \circ f$ . Define  $F: G^{\kappa} \to G^{\kappa}$  by

$$F(\varkappa_1, \varkappa_2, \dots, \varkappa_{\kappa}) = (f(\varkappa_2), f(\varkappa_3), \dots, f(\varkappa_{\kappa}), f(\varkappa_1)), \tag{1.2}$$

or

$$F(\varkappa_1, \varkappa_2, \dots, \varkappa_{\kappa}) = (f(\varkappa_{\kappa}), f(\varkappa_1), f(\varkappa_2) \dots, f(\varkappa_{\kappa-1})), \tag{1.3}$$

where  $\kappa$  is a positive integer and assign a difference equation of the form

$$\chi_{n+1} = F(\chi_n), \qquad n \ge 0. \tag{1.4}$$

Therefore we get two systems of the form

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = f(\varkappa_n^{(2)}), \ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = f(\varkappa_n^{(3)}), \dots, \ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = f(\varkappa_n^{(1)}), \tag{1.5}$$

and

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = f(\varkappa_n^{(\kappa)}), \ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = f(\varkappa_n^{(1)}), \dots, \ \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = f(\varkappa_n^{(\kappa-1)}).$$
(1.6)

Taking

$$f(\varkappa) = rac{\varkappa}{lpha \varkappa - 1},$$

which satisfies  $f \circ f = I$ , i. e. every  $\varkappa \neq 1/\alpha$  is a fixed point of  $f^2$ . Thus, whenever  $n \ge 0$ , we obtain

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(2)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(2)} - 1}, \quad \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(3)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(3)} - 1}, \dots, \quad \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(1)} - 1}, \tag{1.7}$$

and

$$\varkappa_{n+1}^{(1)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(\kappa)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(\kappa)} - 1}, \quad \varkappa_{n+1}^{(2)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(1)} - 1}, \quad \dots, \quad \varkappa_{n+1}^{(\kappa)} = \frac{\varkappa_n^{(\kappa-1)}}{\alpha \varkappa_n^{(\kappa-1)} - 1}.$$
(1.8)

#### 2. The Main Results

Here we prove and investigate the periodicity character for the solutions for Eq.(1.4).

**Theorem 2.1.** Each one of the coming statement is true:

(a) Assume that  $\kappa = 0 \pmod{2}$ , then any solution  $\{\chi_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  for Eq.(1.4) with the initial condition  $\chi_0 \in D^{\kappa}$ , is a periodic solution of period  $\kappa$ . (b) Whenever  $\kappa \neq 0 \pmod{2}$ , then any solution  $\{\chi_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  for Eq. (1.4) with the initial condition  $\chi_0 \in D^{\kappa}$ , is a periodic solution of period  $2\kappa$ .

*Proof.* (a) Assume that  $\kappa = 0 \pmod{2}$ . Let  $\{\chi_n\}$  be a solution of Eq.(1.4) with an initial condition  $\chi_0 = (\varkappa_0^{(1)}, \varkappa_0^{(2)}, \dots, \varkappa_0^{(\kappa)}) \in D^{\kappa}$ . It suffices to show that  $F^{\kappa}(\chi_0) = \chi_0$  where *F* is defined by (1.2). Now we will prove by induction that

$$F^{\kappa}(\boldsymbol{\chi}_{0}) = F^{\kappa-2i}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+1)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+2)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i)}), i = 1, \dots, \kappa/2.$$

$$(2.1)$$

Indeed, at i = 1, we obtain

$$\begin{split} F^{\kappa}(\boldsymbol{\chi}_{0}) &= F^{\kappa-1}(f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)}), f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(3)}), \dots, f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}), f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)})) \\ &= F^{\kappa-2}(f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(3)}), f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(4)}), \dots, f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}), f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}), f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)})) \\ &= F^{\kappa-2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(3)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(4)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)}). \end{split}$$

Then relation (2.1) is true at i = 1. Now assume that relation (2.1) is true for some *i*, then we obtain

$$\begin{split} F^{\kappa}(\boldsymbol{\chi}_{0}) &= F^{\kappa-2i}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+1)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+2)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i)}) \\ &= F^{\kappa-(2i+1)}(f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+2)}), f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+3)}) \dots, f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}), f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}), f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)}), \dots, f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+1)})) \\ &= F^{\kappa-(2i+2)}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+3)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+4)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2i+2)}). \end{split}$$

Hence relation (2.1) is true.

Again whenever F is defined by (1.3), we will prove by induction that

$$F^{\kappa}(\boldsymbol{\chi}_{0}) = F^{\kappa-2i}(\varkappa_{0}^{\kappa-(2i-1)}, \varkappa_{0}^{\kappa-(2i-2)}, \dots, \varkappa_{0}^{(\kappa)}, \varkappa_{0}^{(1)}, \varkappa_{0}^{(2)}, \dots, \varkappa_{0}^{(\kappa-2i)}), i = 1, \dots, \kappa/2.$$

Indeed, at i = 1, we get

$$\begin{split} F^{\kappa}(\boldsymbol{\chi}_{0}) &= F^{\kappa-1}(f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}), f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}), f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)}), \dots, f(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa-1)})) \\ &= F^{\kappa-2}(f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa-1)}), f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}), f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}), f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)}), \dots, f^{2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa-2)})) \\ &= F^{\kappa-2}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa-1)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(2)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa-2)}). \end{split}$$

Thus relation (2.2) is true at i = 1. Now assume that relation (2.2) is true for some *i*. We have

$$\begin{split} F^{\kappa}(\boldsymbol{\chi}_{0}) &= F^{\kappa-2i}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{\kappa-(2i-1)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{\kappa-(2i-2)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{\kappa}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{1}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{2}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{\kappa-(2i)}) \\ &= F^{\kappa-(2i+2)}(\boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa-(2i+1))}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa-2i)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa)}, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(1)}, \dots, \boldsymbol{\varkappa}_{0}^{(\kappa-(2i+2))})) \end{split}$$

This shows that relation (2.2) is true for each  $i = 1, ..., \kappa/2$ . (*b*) The proof of this part is similar to part (a) so will be left to the reader.

As a direct consequence we get the following two results.

**Theorem 2.2.** Each one of the coming statement is true:

(a) Assume that  $\kappa = 0 \pmod{2}$ , then any solution  $\{\chi_n = (\varkappa_n^{(1)}, \dots, \varkappa_n^{(\kappa)})\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  for system (1.5) (resp. system (1.6)) with  $\chi_0 = (\varkappa_0^{(1)}, \varkappa_0^{(2)}, \dots, \varkappa_0^{(\kappa)}) \in D^{\kappa}$ , is a periodic solution of period  $\kappa$ .

(b) Assume that  $\kappa \neq 0 \pmod{2}$ , then any solution  $\{\chi_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  for system (1.5) (resp. system (1.6)) where  $\chi_0 \in D^{\kappa}$ , is a periodic solution of period  $2\kappa$ .

## **Theorem 2.3.** Each one of the coming statement is true:

(a) Assume that  $\kappa = 0 \pmod{2}$ , then any solution  $\{\chi_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  for system (1.7) (resp. system (1.8)), is a periodic solution of period  $\kappa$ . (b) Assume that  $\kappa \neq 0 \pmod{2}$ , then any solution  $\{\chi_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  for system (1.7) (resp. system (1.8)), is a periodic solution of period  $2\kappa$ .

**Corollary 2.4.** Assume that  $\alpha > 0$ , then every solution  $\left(\varkappa_n^{(1)}, \varkappa_n^{(2)}, ..., \varkappa_n^{(\kappa)}\right)$  of (1.7) where the conditions  $\left(\varkappa_0^{(1)}, \varkappa_0^{(2)}, ..., \varkappa_0^{(\kappa)}\right)$  to be such that

$$\varkappa_{0}^{(j)} > \frac{1}{\alpha}, \quad j = 1, 2, \dots \kappa,$$
(2.3)

is positive.

*Proof.* Consider  $\{\chi_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$  is a positive solution for system (1.7) where (2.3) is satisfied. Then if  $\kappa = 0 \pmod{2}$ , it follows from (1.7) and (2.3) that

(ii) If  $\varkappa_{0}^{(i)} \to \frac{1}{\alpha}^{+}$ , then  $\left\{\varkappa_{2n}^{(i)}\right\} \to \frac{1}{\alpha}^{+}$  and  $\left\{\varkappa_{2n+1}^{(i)}\right\} \to \infty$ .
